From the First Selectman

The Town budget for TY22-23 has passed and it looks like we have a decrease in the mill rate from 20.6 to a mill rate of 19.8 Giving our residents some relief from this high inflation. The Board of Finance along with the Board of Selectmen worked very hard to achieve this for our residents.

The Selectmen and I rescinded from the Regional Animal Control Contract with Torrington & Litchfield, as you might have read in the newspaper. The new facility is going to cost \$2.8 million dollars up from \$1 million to construct which was written in the original contract for the construction of a new facility. Saving our town \$134,000 in capital and possibly more tax dollars because of the extra cost of construction. We also cut the Animal Control budget in half by hiring two (2) Animal Control officers: ACO Kate Graham & Deputy ACO Jack Malahan. Their contact information is available in the Town employee directory and on the Town website. Don't forget to register your dog, the new ACO's will need to know whose dog they picked up.

In a conversation with our Goshen Fire Company's Fire Chief Barry Hall, he stated the Fire Company will be having an EMT course in the fall for residents who are looking to become a volunteer. The Fire Company is always looking for volunteers for EMS, Fire Fighters, Dive Team, Air Boat and Search and Rescue Teams. Contact Fire Chief Hall today to register.

Special thanks goes out to our residents for recycling, it's helping with keeping our tipping fees cost down. Please continue to compost and recycle.

The Selectmen are working on a new Communication Task Force, this will be a great help in letting the residents of Goshen know what's going on in Town.

Welcome to Goshen, Connecticut! As a new Goshen resident, the State Department of Motor Vehicles has specific driver's license and motor vehicle registration requirements, you are required to transfer your out of state registration to Connecticut within 60 days. If you are moving from one town to another within Connecticut you may change your address and Tax Town online at the DMV website.

At the May 25th Annual Budget and Special Town Meeting, we voted to change the Hawkers, Peddler and Vendor Ordinance and rescinded the Regional Animal Control Ordinance and voted to adopt an Animal Control Fee Ordinance. The Town Ordinances can be found on the Town website by going to Goshenct.gov, "HOW DO I?", under view title, Town Ordinances.

The last day that an enrolled elector could transfer from one party to another and be eligible to vote in the primary has passed. Whenever transferring parties for any primary it must be done 90 days before the primary voting day. If you are registered as an unaffiliated voter you are not registered in a party. The deadline to enroll in the Republican or Democratic party is August 8, 2022, by noon.

Special note to 17 year olds: If you are 17 now and will be 18 by the November 8, 2022 election you may vote in the Republican or Democratic primary as long as you are a registered Republican or Democrat.

Further News: In 2012 The State House of Representatives [redistricting plan](#) saw our small town of Goshen split into two districts. The redistricting caused Goshen to have 2 voting districts. The 2022 redistricting plan sees us being brought back together into one district. We will all vote in one polling place! We will all go in the same door at Camp Cochipianee and out the far door. No more confusion.

We are always looking for people to work at the polling place. You need to be at least sixteen years old to work the polls. If you are interested please give us a call we would love to hear from you.

Taxes Due: July 1, 2021

Last day to pay without penalty: Monday, August 2, 2021

Pursuant to Sec. 12-145 of the Connecticut statutes, the undersigned Tax Collector of the Town of Goshen gives notice that she will be ready to receive Motor Vehicle taxes and the first installment of Real Estate and Personal Property taxes due July 1, 2021 at the Tax Collector's office located in the Goshen Town Hall, 42A North St, Goshen, CT on Tuesdays from 9:00 – Noon and Wednesdays 1:00 – 4:00.

Payments must be received or postmarked by August 2, 2021 to avoid interest.

All taxes remaining unpaid after August 2, 2021 will be charged interest from July 1, 2021 at the rate of 1.5% for each month elapsing from the due date of the delinquent tax to the date of payment, with a minimum interest charge of \$2.00. Sec. 12-146 Failure to receive a tax bill does not relieve the taxpayer of his/her responsibility for the payment of taxes or delinquent charges. Sec. 12-130

JULY 2022 MOTOR VEHICLE TAX BILLS

Please note that both new and used motor vehicles (including cars, SUVs, trucks, RVs and motorcycles) have increased in value substantially since October 2020. Issues such as global computer chip shortages, increased labor and production costs, supply chain delays, delivery back-ups and inflation have attributed to the increase in value and shortages in inventory. In Goshen, motor vehicle values have increased by 21.7% for the October 1, 2021 Grand List.

We know it can be frustrating and upsetting as we are used to seeing our car values decrease with age, but unfortunately this may not be the case for many of us this year.

Motor vehicles in Connecticut are currently valued as of October 1st using the J.D. Power - NADA Pricing Guides. If you would like to verify the October 1, 2021 value of your vehicle, we will be happy to look it up for you or you are welcome to come into the Assessor's Office to review the guides.

PROPERTY TAX EXEMPTIONS AVAILABLE IN GOSHEN

Veterans Exemption: To be eligible for this exemption, the veteran must have served during a period of war as specified in State Statute 27-103, have an honorable discharge and must file with the Town Clerk in the town of residence by September 30th a *Certificate of Release or Discharge from Active Duty* (DD-214). It is only necessary to file once for this exemption. Active duty military personnel are also eligible for this exemption and must file a letter stating active duty status by September 30th each year.

Goshen residents meeting the Basic Veteran's Exemption in accordance with State Statute 12-81(19) may be eligible for an additional assessment exemption if they meet certain income limits. Applications are available from the Assessor's Office and must be filed by October 1st. Once a veteran has been approved for this additional exemption, an application must be submitted every other year.

Disabled Veterans Exemption: To be eligible for this exemption, submit a copy of your Veteran's Disability Rating statement from the Veteran's Administration. Disabled veterans that have established their eligibility for this exemption are no longer required to file annually unless there is a change in the percentage of disability.

Active Duty Vehicle Exemption: A Goshen resident who is a member of the armed forces of the United States (including the reserves or Connecticut National Guard) on the October 1 assessment date may be eligible for the total exemption of one motor vehicle which is registered to or leased by the service person. Application is to be filed no later than December 31st following the property tax due date. Annual filing is required.

Handicapped Equipped Motor Vehicles: A local-option exemption is available for a specially equipped motor vehicle owned by a person with disabilities or owned by the parent or guardian of a person with disabilities.

Exemption for Blindness: To receive a \$3,000 assessment exemption, certification of blindness must be obtained from the State of Connecticut, Board of Education and Services for the Blind. This certificate must be dated and filed with the Assessor by October 1st. It is only necessary to file once for this exemption.

Exemption for Totally Disabled: To receive a \$1,000 assessment exemption, proof of permanent total disability from the Social Security Administration and a signed Form D-1 Application must be submitted to the Assessor by October 1st. It is only necessary to file once for this exemption.

Any qualifying exemptions will be applied to the following July tax bill.

Relief Program Available to Elderly and Totally Disabled Renters

Applications for elderly or totally disabled renters who wish to apply for the Renters Relief Program are available at the Goshen Assessor's Office. The filing period is April 1, 2022 to October 1, 2022.

Eligibility Requirements

- 65 years of age or older by December 31, 2021 or 100% disabled
- 2021 **qualifying** income, including all Social Security benefits, must not exceed **\$38,100 for a single individual** or **\$46,400 for a married couple**.

Required Income Documentation

(all for calendar year 2021)

- Social Security Income – 2021 Form SSA-1099 & SSI if applicable
- Copy of 2021 Federal Income Tax Return & all schedules, if filed
- 1099 forms for pensions, dividends, interest, stocks & bonds, etc.
- 2021 W-2 Wage & Tax Statements from employment
- 2021 Veterans Disability, Veterans Pension or Railroad Retirement statement
- **100% Disabled:** Benefit Verification letter from Social Security **stating date disability began** along with other forms listed above if applicable.

Required Expense Documentation

- Rent receipts for 2021 (all 12 months)
- Utility bills you paid in 2021 (oil, gas, electric & water only). **NO** telephone, cable, garbage removal or medical bills

GOSHEN SPECIAL USE ASSESSMENTS

Farm, Forest and Open Space: Owners wishing to classify land as farm, forest or open space should contact the Assessor's Office for details and applications. All applications must be filed with the Assessor's Office between September 1st and October 31st.

Town of Goshen begins the 2022 Revaluation

Revaluation Summary

The Town of Goshen has selected Vision Government Solutions to assist with the town-wide 2022 revaluation project. Vision's Appraisal division will be working closely with the Assessor's Office to make the process successful for the Town.

The last statistical update was completed in 2012 and a revaluation was done in 2017. Connecticut state law requires towns to revalue every five years. A revaluation will determine the fair market value of every property in town and equalizes the values of all properties for the purpose of a fair distribution of the tax burden.

The major phases of a municipal revaluation are:

- Data Collection
- Market Analysis
- Valuation
- Field Review
- Informal Hearings

Beginning Phase 1 of the Revaluation

Starting in Spring 2022, Data Collection will begin. Vision will proceed with exterior data collection on current open building permits. This data collection is critical, as it enables us to ensure accurate measurements both on main structures and outbuildings and to visually verify exterior characteristics of the property and condition. Data collectors will physically inspect the exterior only and will not enter any structure. If an interior inspection is needed, Vision Government Solutions will send a letter to the property owner requesting that the property owner call to arrange for a virtual interior inspection (via facetime or equivalent) at a future date.

All data collectors will be wearing reflective clothing, carry an identification badge and a letter of introduction, have an "Assessor's Office" sign posted in the vehicle window, and their cars will be registered with the First Selectman's Office as well as the Assessor's Office in the Town Hall.

The Town of Goshen continues to actively monitor the evolving health situation regarding COVID-19 (coronavirus) and is deeply committed to the continued health and safety of our residents and data collectors. We will be aligning with the social distancing protocols and other safety precautions that are recommended at the federal and state level.

Market analysis and valuation has begun, to be followed by field review of properties to check and re-check values to ensure uniformity and accuracy of information. This will be followed by a Notice of New Values mailed to each property owner and an Informal Hearings phase, which enables anyone with questions concerning the revaluation process an opportunity to meet with a member of Vision's staff to discuss their property value.

PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT

The Public Works Department strives to maintain and improve the appearance of Town roadways and property. This could not be accomplished without the hard work of the Public Works full and part-time employees.

CAPITAL & ROAD IMPROVEMENT PROJECTS

During the 2022 Summer Season, the Public Works Department will be chip sealing approximately 8 miles of road in the south east area of Town. Roads slated for chip sealing have been crack sealed and areas of asphalt in poor condition have been shimmed over with a new layer of asphalt. This work is a part of the 10 year pavement management plan instituted by the Town in 2014. Public works will also be working on drainage projects on West Hyerdale Drive, Canterbury Ct, and Allenby Ct. prior to the reclaiming and paving of the roads later this summer. Additional smaller drainage improvement projects will be taking place on sections of roads throughout Town.

NEW STONE WALL ORDINANCE

Town Ordinance Title 73, Ordinance Concerning Highway Boundary Stone Walls, has been enacted. The Ordinance is posted on the Town website Ordinance page for review. A permit must be obtained prior to performing any work, relocation, or removal of a highway boundary wall lining the Town or State roadways within the limits of Goshen. Permit applications are available at the Public Works Department office or can be downloaded on the Public Works page of the Town website. DRIVEWAY ORDINANCE AND PIPE MAINTENANCE

Town Ordinance Title 18, Town of Goshen Driveway Ordinance, is concerning the construction of driveways including temporary access driveways on Town roadways as well as maintenance of existing driveways. A permit must be obtained prior to the start of construction of a new driveway, repaving, regrading, or drainage improvements to an existing driveway, if any of the proposed work is to take place in the Town right-of-way. A cash bond will need to be posted by the property owner or contractor performing the work. The bond amount will be calculated at the time of application and is based upon the probable cost of the work to be performed in the right-of-way. There is no fee for a driveway permit application. Permit applications are available at the Public Works Department office or can be downloaded on the Public Works page of the Town website. BASKETBALL HOOPS AND OTHER RECREATIONAL EQUIPMENT

As summer approaches please be reminded roadways and right-of-ways are not playgrounds. Recreational equipment left in the roads and right-of-ways creates a safety hazard for all. The Town cannot be responsible for any damage to this property, and you may be held liable in the case of an accident for damage caused by such items.

LITTER ALONG THE TOWN ROADS

If anyone is aware of, or suspects any illegal dumping along Town Roads, call the State Police, Public Works Department, or the Town Offices to report any suspicious activity.

WORK ZONE SAFETY

The Public Works staff would very much appreciate your giving them as much room as possible while they are working. Any job site the Public Works Department is working at is considered a **WORK ZONE** and fines will be **DOUBLED** per state law. Please drive carefully and slowly through all work zones. Additionally, visibility to the rear of the large trucks is very poor. **PLEASE STAY BACK AND ASSUME THAT THE DRIVER DOES NOT SEE YOU.** If possible, please find an alternate route until road work is completed.

MOWING TOWN ROADS

The Public Works Department will be mowing all Town roadsides in the months of June, July, and August. Obey the posted speed limits and be cognizant of these slow moving tractors that may be coming around the next corner and in your travel lane. Please note that the operator must be focused on the many obstacles in his mowing path as well as the surrounding traffic. Please be alert and courteous, allowing ample room for the tractor.

CATCH BASIN CLEANING

The Public Works Department will be cleaning out the silt and litter that collects over time in the catch basins and silt traps at the beginning of July. The majority of this work is performed with a Vac-truck rented from the Northwest Hills Council of Government's Public Works Equipment Cooperative. This catch basin cleaning operation keeps debris from obstructing and degrading our Town's beautiful waterways and maintains their recreational and wildlife habitat value. Again we ask that you please be careful when driving through the area where the Public Works crews are working hard to make your Town a better place to live and play.

Dog season is upon us. All dogs six month of age or over must be registered. Licensing starts June 1 – June 30. If you are registering your dog for the first time in Goshen please remember to bring in a current rabies certificate and papers showing that your dog is spayed or neutered. You may also submit this by mail as well. The cost is as follows:

- \$8.00 for a spayed or neutered dog
- \$19.00 for an unaltered dog
- \$51.00 for a kennel license
- \$1.00 per month late fee

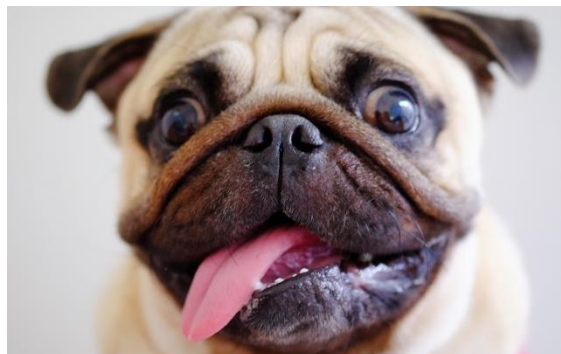

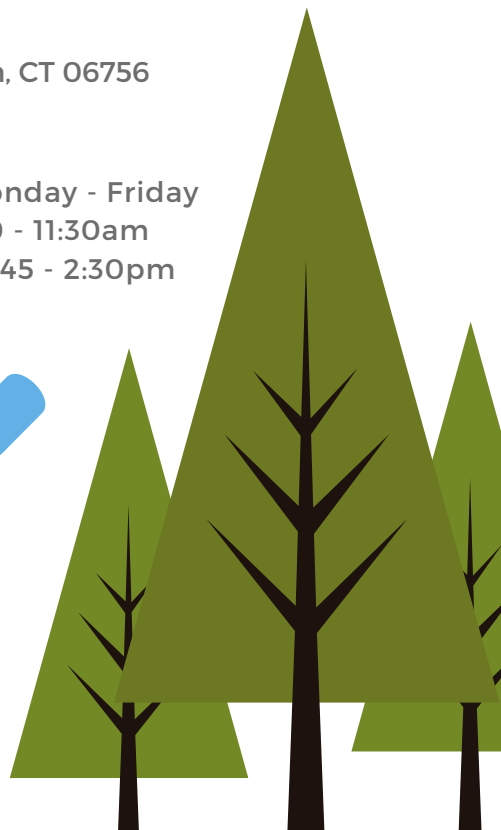

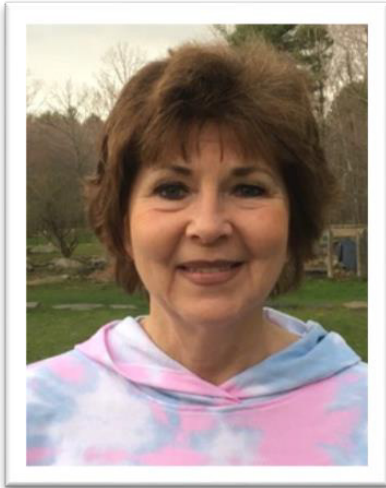

Donna Molon – Monarch Butterfly Enthusiast

Note: This is the first in a series of biographical interviews with individuals in the Goshen community. The focus of the interview is to explore their personal Interests and activities that give joy, serenity, humor, happiness and the many other emotions that help to support their personal and their community's mental health.

Sitting at the Milk and Honey Grill in the center of Goshen, Donna "lights up" when she tells me about her Monarchs. It first started when she attended a talk about Monarch butterflies at the Goshen Library. The speaker encouraged her to "enjoy" this project with her 4 year old son. Just think, a children's activity that didn't cost anything, gives you plenty of outdoor activity in the fresh air and sunshine to observe a truly miraculous and fascinating act of Nature. It also can be brought indoors and closely observed on a rainy day.

That's when it all started. And today, twenty years later, there is a beautiful picture of Donna standing in a sun soaked field of tall sparkling green grass, collecting Monarch butterfly eggs. Why? Because soon the local farmer will mow the grass and they will be destroyed. She is saving them. She will bring them into her house and keep them in a safe place until they become beautiful butterflies and she will help them fly away to be what creation has destined them to be.

How does this make her feel? "Serene", "Spiritual". Although she is saddened when the chrysalis is eaten by the larvae of a predator fly and that not many Monarchs make it in the wild. But she says "it's a good day when they make it". And she helps many make it.

Her enthusiasm is passed on to friends and family. Her granddaughter has an inner smile and relaxed pose as she watches the monarch on the balcony rim. They are recovering from their exit from the chrysalis and will soon leave on their journey - maybe toward Mexico.

All this, fresh air, sunshine, fascination, this is a natural high that we keep in our memory for a lifetime. And it is free. We are truly thankful for Donna and her love of Monarchs. It makes us all happier and healthier.

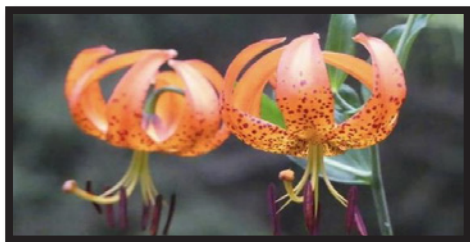

Sustainable Goshen

On February 20th the Board of Selectmen passed a resolution that charged the Sustainable Goshen Team to earn Goshen a Bronze Certification with Sustainable CT. We plan to have the certification by December 2022. What does that mean?

The fact is that towns sometimes die or fade into oblivion. We have all driven through those towns – and they are so sad. What makes a town thrive instead? Finding out is what started Sustainable CT, which is based on years of research. They determined that thriving towns all have specific characteristics that they divided into twelve categories of policies and/or practices.

All Residents are Respected and have a Voice	Town Buildings use Energy Efficiently
Local Economy is Supported	Community Communications are Effective
Natural Resources are Protected	Waste/Recycling Management is Strategic
Art and Creative Culture is Celebrated	Health and Wellness is Optimized for All
Town Planning is Resilient	Housing is Healthy, Efficient and Diverse
Town Vehicles/Roads are Maintained with a Plan	Homelessness Prevention is Compassionate

On April 5th we submitted five items to be reviewed and, hopefully, begin our journey to earn 200 points for a Bronze Certification by August 23rd, the last submission date in 2022. Each of the twelve categories above have multiple ways, or actions, that a town can show they are working on or are continually implementing a sustainable action.

Why do we think Certification is important?

Because we love Goshen. And we think it is important to make our town a place where future generations will have the same feeling of gratitude we have because we get to wake up in this lovely spot in Northwestern Connecticut and watch the seasons change (and sometimes change back by the afternoon, but that's a part of the experience, right?).

Our town isn't perfect, but it's got a lot going for it. The goal is to document what we are doing right and think about what we could do to make things better. Currently we are supporting the planting of pollinator gardens; the new Seed Library at our Public Library; the collection of plastic film and the composting initiative by the Recycling and Trash Committee; the Goshen Farmers' Market; Random Acts of Clean Up with the Goshen Community Care and Hospice; a 'Trails for All' initiative with the town Parks and Recs, Conservation Commission and the Goshen Land Trust; and the First Selectman's Town Tree project. In the near future we will help organize a Green Bank presentation with the Goshen Business Circle to help local businesses learn more about opportunities in renewable energy. And there are a lot more ideas out there!

Wildlife: Moose facts

North America's largest member of the deer family is the moose. The subspecies found in Connecticut is the Eastern moose, ranging from the northeastern US into eastern Canada and Newfoundland and westward to the Great Lakes.

Description

Moose are very large animals with long, slender, grayish-white legs. They may stand over 6 feet tall at the shoulders and can weigh up to 1,400 pounds. Females (cows) are smaller than males (bulls). On average, cows weigh 750 pounds while bulls weigh 1,000 pounds. Both cows and bulls have variable coat colors ranging from tan to blackish-brown, depending on their age and the season (an annual molt occurs in spring). Their tracks are heart-shaped, like a white-tailed deer, but measure from 4 to over 6 inches long and 3.5-5.75 inches wide. Males have a black face while the female's face is brown. Both have a skin flap or "bell" underneath their throat, with the bull's noticeably larger than that of the cow's.

Adult males have impressive antlers which are shed annually. The antlers begin to grow in early spring and are fully developed by late summer. Males scrape the velvet off the antlers by rubbing against trees and shrubs. These palmately-branched antlers can weigh close to 60 pounds and spread to more than 5 feet across. Male calves sometimes develop "button" antlers and yearlings usually develop "spikes."

Habitat and Diet

Moose live in forests. They eat buds, twigs, and leaves from a variety of shrubs and trees, including birch, maple, and cherry. In spring and summer, moose may be found foraging for aquatic plants in wetlands. Moose have a strong sense of smell and hearing but their eyesight is poor. They are very fast runners, and have been clocked at 35 to 40 miles per hour.

An average moose can eat 40 to 50 pounds of food each day. A nursing female may eat over 60 pounds of food each day. It is not unusual for a moose to strip bark from trees when food sources are low.

In New England, there are no predators capable of taking a healthy adult moose, but elsewhere in their range, grizzly bears and wolves are predators.

One of the greatest mortality factors for an unhunted population of adult moose is the meningeal worm, a parasite of white-tailed deer. This parasite attacks the membranes surrounding the brain and spinal cord. Although not fatal to white-tailed deer, it is deadly for moose. The parasite passes from a deer through its feces, which are then eaten by snails. Moose obtain the parasite by inadvertently ingesting snails when browsing on vegetation.

Connecticut Moose Facts

The first sighting of a moose cow with calves in Connecticut was reported in 2000 in Hartland. Between 2000 and 2007, at least 40 calves were born in the state (this number only includes reported sightings by the public). In addition, other moose likely were born in Connecticut or dispersed into the state from Massachusetts. Deer hunters reported 71 moose sightings (105 individuals) in 32 towns (1 unknown) in 2016 and 949 sightings over the past 20 years. During the 20-year period, moose sightings were reported in 86 different towns. Sightings were reported from 9 to 43 different towns each year. Moose were observed in Barkhamsted, Canaan, Colebrook, Goshen, Granby, Hartland, Norfolk, Salisbury, Stafford, and Union for 6 of the last 10 years.

Moose Management

Moose can present a serious threat to public safety under some circumstances. Although usually shy, moose can feel threatened and become aggressive during the rutting season or after calving. They also may demonstrate unpredictable behavior if they wander into populated areas. Under no circumstances should moose be approached. Although they may appear to be docile, moose should be given the healthy respect that New England's largest land mammal warrants.

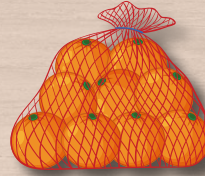

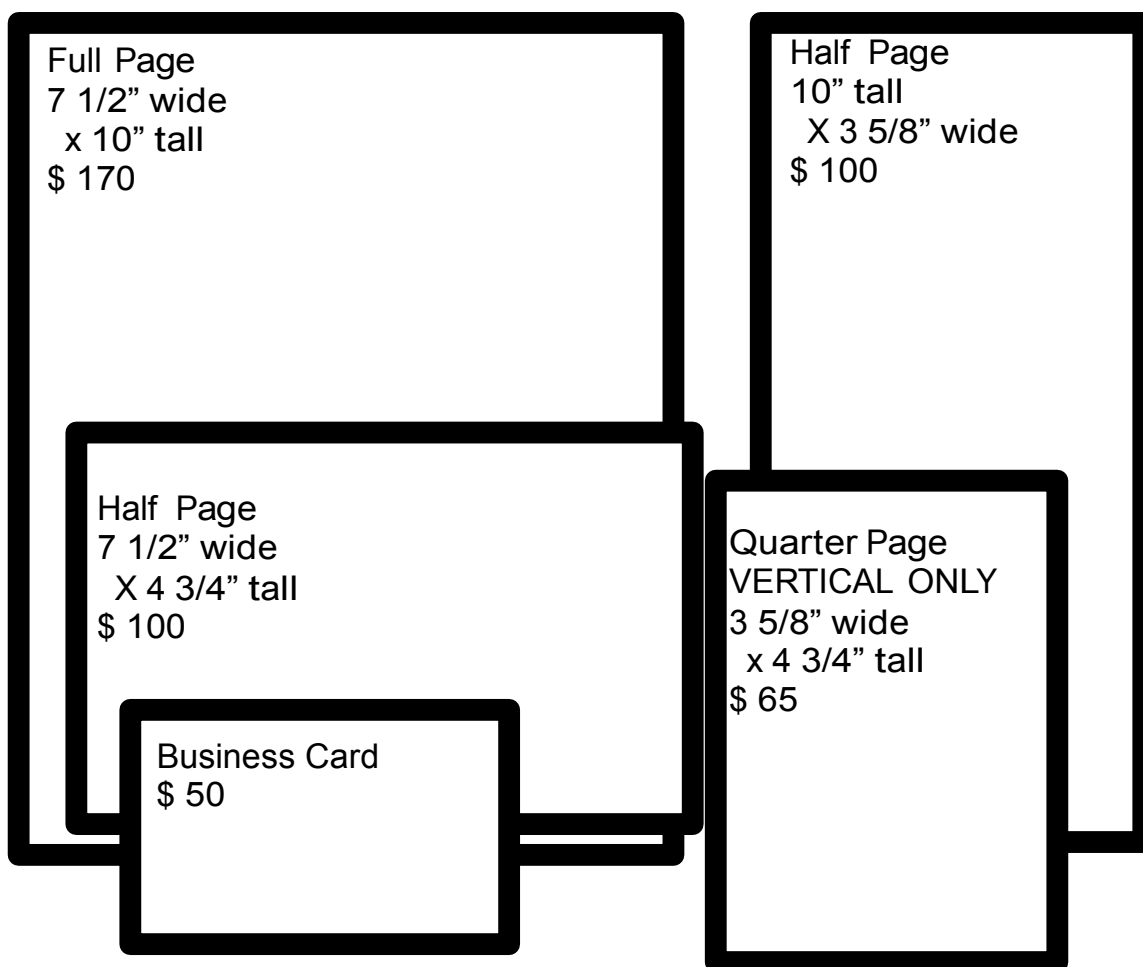

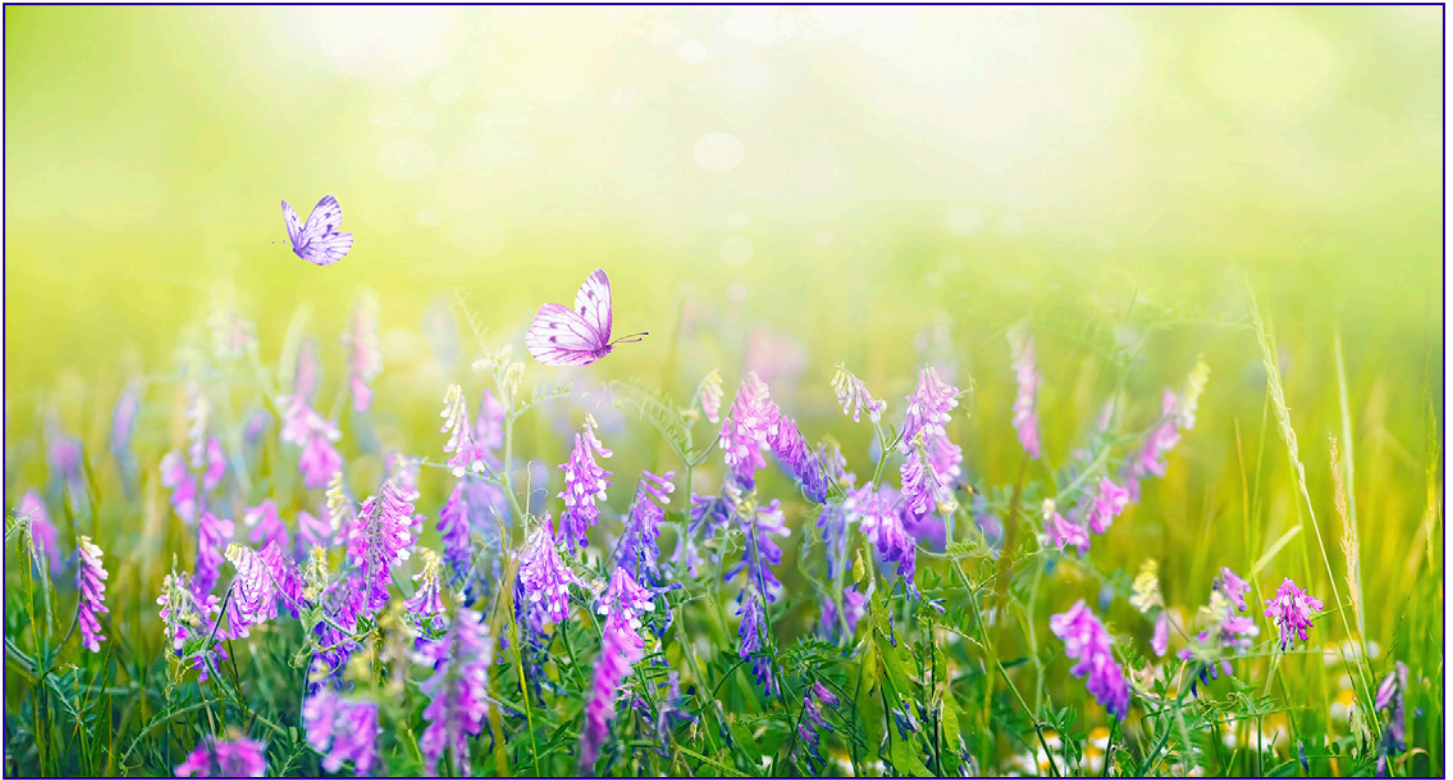
